

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
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INTRODUCING MARTA AND MAUREEN

She led American churches in planting new ones with international church partners. 



The love of husband toward wife



"The noun 'ahăbâ describes the love of husband toward wife, as that of Jacob for Rachel (Gen 29:20). God's "love" for his people is designated by the same word (Deut 7:8; II Chr 2:11; et al.). Jonathan's affection for David is also 'ahăbâ (I Sam 18:3; 20:17; cf. II Sam 1:26).

'ahăbâ occurs frequently in the wisdom literature and a few times in the latter prophets. Proverbs uses the word in its most abstract form: "love covers all sins" (10:12), "better a dinner where love is" (15:17; cf. Eccl 9:1, 6). Naturally, the word is used in the Song of Solomon. It is the term for "love" in several familiar verses. "His banner over me is love" (2:4). "I am sick of love" (2:5; 5:8). "Love is strong as death" (8:6). "Many waters cannot quench love" (8:7).





Famous passages in the prophets use this word as well. "I have loved you with an everlasting love" (Jer 31:3). "I drew them ... with bands of love" (Hos 11:4). "And what does the Lord require of you but to do justice and to love mercy" (Mic 6:8), lit. "the love of mercy" ('ahăbat ḥesed)."

DAY 1 SEAL OF LOVE

"Put me like a seal over your heart, like a seal on your arm.

For love is as strong as death."

Song of Solomon 8:6

ong of Solomon

(also known as

Song of Songs) is

a unique collection of songs

compiled into one poem.



It seems to depict the romantic love between a man and his beloved, with a periodic chorus of "The Daughters of Jerusalem."

"Put me like a seal over your heart, like a seal on your arm. For love is as strong as death," Song of Solomon 8:6. This verse described when the couple came from the wilderness, arm in arm. The woman spoke



of having her likeness put on a signet ring as a seal. Tradition dictated the ring would have been wrapped around the arm, on the hand, or worn as a necklace. It represented security and ownership and forever would be part of the wearer. She never wanted to let her beloved go. She wanted that marriage to last forever. She said, "Love is as strong as death."

Some scholars believe the woman represents the church, the Bride of Christ, and the man represents Jesus. The moment we accept Jesus as our Lord and Savior, we desire to have a permanent place in His heart. We wish to have

our personal "seal" always in His presence. Ephesians 1:13 verifies this, "In Him, you also, after listening to the message of truth, the gospel of your salvation—having



also believed, you were sealed in Him with the Holy Spirit of promise."


"Love is as strong as death." Those words are profound and true. I pray today you feel the love of Jesus and know you are forever part of His seal.



"There is little variation in the basic meaning of this verb. The intensity of the meaning ranges from God's infinite affection for his people to the carnal appetites of a lazy glutton. 'āhēb frequently describes love between human beings. The love of father for son is exemplified by Abraham and Isaac (Gen 22:2) and Israel and Joseph (Gen 37:3). A slave might "love" his master and wish to identure himself to him for the rest of his life (Ex 21:8). This is the word used in the rule "love your neighbor




as yourself" (Lev 19:18). "Love" of the stranger is also incumbent on the faithful (Deut 10:19). Samson had apparently told Delilah that he "loved" her (Jud 14:16; 16:15). Ruth "loved" Naomi her mother-in-law (4:15), Elkanah "loved" his wife Hannah (I Sam 1:5), and Rebekah "loved" her son Jacob (Gen 25:28). Hiram's "love" for David illustrates international friendship or irenic politics between the two (I Kgs 3:1). Notice that nowhere is the love of children toward parents mentioned. Rather, they are to honor, revere, and obey.

People may love things concrete or abstract. Isaac "loved" savory meat (Gen 27:4); others are said to "love" oil (Prov 21:17), silver (Eccl 5:9), and gifts (Isa 1:23). The Psalmist "loved" God's commandments (Ps 119:47). law (v. 97),

testimonies (v. 119), and precepts (v. 159). Men can "love" evil (Ps 32:3 [H 5]), or death (Prov 8:36), vanity (Ps 4:2 [H 3]), cursing (Ps 109:17), or a false oath (Zech 8:17). Or they can "love" good (Amos 5:15), truth and peace (Zech 8:19), salvation (Ps 40:16 [H 17]), and wisdom (Prov 29:3).

God has commanded man to "love" him (Deut 6:5). and the Psalms contain testimonies of obedience to that commandment (116:1; 145:20). Conversely, God "loves" men, especially his people Israel (Deut 4:37; Isa 43:4; Mal 1:2). The Lord also "loves" other things, such as the gates of Zion (Ps 87:2), righteousness and judgment (Ps 33:5). and the holy temple (Mal 2:11). In a few places the verb introduces an infinitive. Jeremiah (14:10) accused the people of loving to wander, while Isaiah charged them with loving to sleep (56:10). The verb itself is sometimes an infinitive, as in Josh 22:5 and Isa 56:6. At least once it is a gerund, "a time to love" (Eccl 3:8)."

love is sacrifice; love is obedience.

Abraham proved his love to the King of kings by his obedience in Genesis 22.

Most are familiar with this episode. As you know, Abraham was tested by the Lord when he was directed to sacrifice his son, Isaac, as a burnt offering.

Genesis 22:1 informs us this exercise was a test. The Lord did not intend for Abraham to offer his son as a sacrifice. Hebrews 11:19 reveals Abraham believed God was able to raise men from the dead. Thus, Abraham's obedience would not have jeopardized his son.

Hebrew is the original language of the Old Testament. The words ahab (love), shachah (worship), and shama' (obey) are used together for the first time in

Genesis 22. What does this moving chapter teach us? First, Abraham's act proved that his love for God was great. Second, Abraham's obedience was a display of worship of his Lord. Third, the Hebrew word worship, šāḥâ, means to bring low, giving an indication of one humbling oneself.



In this context, Abraham was humbling himself before the Almighty God.

What was the result of Abraham's obedience? "And in your seed all the nations of the earth shall be blessed" (Genesis 22:18). Then we are told why "because you have obeyed My voice." Therefore, if we love the Lord, we will obey Him; and our obedience is an act of worshiping the Lord.

We, God's people, like Abraham, must make a choice. When we place what is most precious to us on God's altar, we obey the Lord and humble ourselves to the will of the Lord. And as Abraham, we will receive His blessing, not for the entire world, but for ourselves and those we know.

DAY 3 GOD'S LOVE BRINGS GREAT POWER

"Because He [God] loved your fathers, therefore He chose their descendants after them. And He personally brought you from Egypt by His great power; driving out from before you nations greater and mightier than you, to bring you in and to give you their land for an inheritance, as it is today."

Deuteronomy 4:37-38

The lief caused the children of Israel to wander for forty years.





Except for Joshua and Caleb, their unbelief caused everyone over the age of 20 to die in the wilderness. Deuteronomy is Moses' recounting of the words the Lord had expressed forty years earlier when he met with God on Mt. Sinai.

As Deuteronomy begins, the Israelites were finally preparing to enter the Promised Land.

Most of Moses' audience had not heard his exhortation on Mt Sinai because they had not been born! It is interesting that the Hebrew word love, áhab, is used nineteen times in Deuteronomy; yet the book is known as the Second Law.

Deuteronomy 4:37-38 advised the next generation, "Because He [God] loved your fathers, therefore He chose their descendants after them. And He personally brought you from Egypt by His great power; driving out from before

you nations greater and mightier than you, to bring you in and to give you their land for an inheritance, as it is today." God's love always multiplies. Why did the next generation receive the Lord's gracious hand? The Lord was gracious to them because He loved their fathers, the previous generation.



Moses wanted to ensure the Israelites understood how greatly the Lord loved His people and the great lengths to which He would go to prove His love.

Today, there is a generation that does not know God, who He is, or how much He loves them! We must become like Moses, Joshua, and Caleb so we can tell all that the Lord has done because He loves us. The next generation must understand the words Moses taught in Deuteronomy 4:39, "Know therefore today, and take it to your heart, that the Lord, He is God in heaven above and on the earth below; there is no other."

DAY 4 COVENANT LOVE

"Know therefore that the Lord your God, He is God, the faithful God, who keeps His covenant and His lovingkindness to a thousandth generation with those who love Him and keep His commandments."

Deuteronomy 7:9

Thy do we often

As a child, I remember hearing of God cursing sin even to the third and fourth generation (Exodus 34:7). Yet I was a Christian many years before I heard anyone speak on Deuteronomy 7:9, which tells of the Lord keeping covenant to a thousand generations! God kept a kingdom for David's descendants on the throne of Israel even after Solomon forsook the Lord.

The Lord keeping covenant for a thousand generations is exciting! What does this verse teach? It tells us the Lord is faithful; we can depend upon Him, unlike the world around us. We learn that God is a covenant God. What does this mean? This means we can trust God to do as He promised. Covenant is a binding agreement. In Biblical times, the covenant was not ratified until the person initiating the covenant died. As with a last will and testament, until the originator dies, his intentions are not executed.

In Genesis 15, God cut a covenant with Abram (Abraham); however, this called for the death of God to secure the Covenant. This was accomplished



2,000 years later when God sent Jesus to His sacrificial death on the cross to pay for the sins of humanity, thus blessing the thousands of generations who love Him and keep His commandments. I often say obedience always equals blessings. Yes, in God's lovingkindness, He chooses to bless us to a thousandth generation through His Son, Jesus. We don't deserve it; we can earn it, but we must receive it. "For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish, but have eternal life" (John 3:16).

MY STORY COLLINS GRACE

s I write this story, my eyes are full of happy tears, and my heart is truly about to explode with pure joy and thankfulness.

You see, my great-granddaughter was just born to my grandson, who stole my heart from the moment I saw him on ultrasound 30 years ago, and his sweet loving wife.

This is a great story of love, faithfulness, trust, and, most of all, God's goodness.

During the summer of 1992, Southern California was struck by two very serious earthquakes in the early morning hours of June 28. Severe damage was felt throughout the town where I lived. It was an unsettling time as we were in constant fear of aftershocks or another quake.



Three days later, I received my own personal "earthquake". My seventeen-year-old daughter, Hayley (who had never given me one moment of trouble), and her then ex-boyfriend came to my office to tell me she was pregnant. I felt as if the world just froze in time, then as if it were spinning, and then as if it would never stop shaking. Buildings did not crumble, and glass did not break, but my hopes, dreams, and plans for my child were in a heap beneath the rubble. Yes, I think I went a little crazy for the next few days and tried to figure out a solution to this huge "problem".

Shame, embarrassment, anger, sadness, foolishness, and shock are just some of the feelings I remember. Abortion was never an option in our home. We would raise the child in our home, and Hayley would complete high school. We would make the best of a difficult situation.

I was still a mom, however, and went with my daughter to doctor appointments and cared for her as needed. I will NEVER forget the day of her first ultrasound. She was 7 months into her pregnancy, and I accompanied her to an ultrasound. Trust me, I was still not thrilled about this baby but kept praying God would intervene somehow.

God has never failed me. That day, during the ultrasound procedure, that baby in the womb looked directly at me and stole my heart.

Cody was my first grandchild. He was born on January 12, 1993, and has been a joy to everyone who has ever known him. I describe this grandparent thing as though we are an onion. A new layer is peeled off, and a whole new level of love comes out when you have a grandchild.

My daughter, Hayley, also grew up and blossomed through all this and has been a wonderful parent. I never stopped praying for my grandson Cody, and he was on my prayer list weekly in my group studies while he was in high school and college. We prayed God would protect him and grow him in his love for Jesus, and God would bring him a Jesus-loving wife.

All these things have happened!!!! Cody loves the Lord with all his heart, and his wife, Carlee, does as well. Now, they have peeled back another layer of my love and brought forth a beautiful baby girl, Collins Grace. You see, God's love never divides; it only multiplies.

"And as for you, you meant evil against me, but God meant it for good" (Genesis 50:20). He has proven this to me over and over in my life, but Collins is the icing on the cake! Matthew 24:12-13, "...most people's love will grow cold. But the one who endures to the end, he shall be saved."

We have all endured, and we shall all be saved. I know deep in my heart and soul that Jesus loves me. My humanity does not allow me to grasp the true depth of that love, but if it's even one small percent of my love for my new great-granddaughter, then I cannot wait to meet Jesus and be wrapped in His arms.



DAY 5 HOW WILL YOUBE REMEMBERED?

"Did not Solomon king of Israel sin regarding these things? Yet among the many nations there was no king like him, and he was loved by his God, and God made him king over all Israel; nevertheless the foreign women caused even him to sin."

Nehemiah 13:26

n his deathbed, David passed the kingdom to Solomon. He encouraged Solomon to walk in



God's ways and keep His statutes and commandments.

Not only would Solomon have success, but also David and his descendants would continue to hold the throne of Israel (1 Kings 2:1-4).

Solomon prayed for wisdom; God not only granted him wisdom but also great wealth. Of all Nehemiah could have said about Solomon, he named Solomon's sin and compared it with an existing situation in Jerusalem.



Nehemiah called out the leaders of Jerusalem for marrying and allowing their children to marry foreign women who enticed them to worship unknown gods. Despite that blatant defiance, Nehemiah wanted them to know God chose to love Solomon and used him mightily in Israel's history. So, since God loved Solomon, God also loved them.

What is the application for us? First, God wants an intimate relationship with us, but sin separates us from Him by interfering with our bond and our communication. God loves us so much that He will NOT allow us to stay in



that sinful condition. Second, our failures do not disqualify us from serving our King.

2,000 years ago, God sent His only Son, Jesus, to pay the penalty for our sins. When we accept His redemptive salvation, Jesus washes our sins away. God's love puts us into His service for the kingdom of God.

he book of Job is one of my favorites and one of my least favorite of the Bible.





The man, Job, is described as "blameless, upright, fearing God, and turning away from evil" Job 1:1. Yet, God allowed Satan to bring unspeakable calamity upon him and all he loved. This book is about pain and a deeper relationship with God. I have studied this book of the Bible intently, once with a group of Bible scholars, yet writing this devotional, I realized one of the reasons God allowed Job to suffer was to bring him into an even deeper relationship with Himself.

1 Thessalonians 5:18 says, «in everything give thanks; for this is God's will for you in Christ, Jesus." This is one of the most challenging commands. Job is the ultimate example of proving his love for the Lord in truly horrendous circumstances.

Job seemed to be full of anguish, "All my associates abhor me, and those I love have turned against me," Job 19:19. He lamented that his best friends, those with whom he had shared his deepest secrets,



detested him, and the people he loved had turned against him. Those were his favorite people in the world.

God showed His love and care for Job by redeeming him. Job 42:7 tells us, "It came about after the Lord had spoken these words to Job, that the Lord said to Eliphaz the Temanite, "My wrath is kindled against you and against your two friends because you have not spoken of Me what is right as My servant Job has."

I wonder, did Job understand real love only comes from our Creator? Was the Lord allowing him to suffer so Job would finally know God's true, neverending love?

"For centuries the word hesed was translated with words like mercy, kindness, love.

In 1927 Nelson Glueck, shortly preceded by I. Elbogen, published a doctoral dissertation in German translated into English by A. Gottschalk, Hesed in the Bible with an introduction by G. A. LaRue which is a watershed in the discussion. His views have been widely accepted. In brief, Glueck built on the growing idea that Israel was bound to its deity by covenants like the Hittite and other treaties. He held that God is pictured as dealing basically in this way with Israel. The Ten Commandments, etc. were stipulations of the covenant, Israel's victories were rewards of covenant keeping, her apostasy was covenant violation and God's hesed was not basically mercy, but loyalty to his covenant obligations, a loyalty which the Israelites should also show. He was followed substantially by W. F. Lofthouse (1933), N. H. Snaith (1944), H. W. Robinson (1946), Ugo Masing (1954), and many others.

There were others, however, who disagreed. F. Assension (1949) argued for mercy, basing his views on the ot versions. H. J. Stoebe (doctoral dissertation 1951, also articles in 1952 VT and in THAT) argued for good-heartedness, kindness. Sidney Hills and also Katherine D. Sakenfeld (The Meaning of Ḥesed in the Hebrew Bible, a New Inquiry), held in general that ḥesed denotes free acts of rescue or deliverance which in prophetic usage includes faithfulness. For this historical survey and references see Sakenfeld pp. 1–13 (hereafter called Sak.); also LaRue in the book by Glueck (here called G.)"¹

re first met Jacob in Genesis 25.

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He was a twin son of Isaac and Rebecca and the grandson of Abraham. At his birth, he was described as "his hand holding on to Esau's heel" Genesis



26:26. Throughout his young life, Jacob seemed to have made questionable decisions that eventually caused him to flee his native country.

Chapter 29 brings Jacob to the land of his relative, Laban. Laban had a beautiful daughter, Rachel, with whom Jacob fell instantly in love. Laban had other plans, however, and it is quite a story. I encourage you to pick up your Bible and read the account of Jacob and Laban, Genesis 28:5-Genesis 32. You won't be able to stop reading!

Laban was Jacob's employer for 20 years, and had changed his contract several times. God intervened when Laban tried to cheat Jacob, proving His "lovingkindness." Jacob wanted to move his family to his homeland. Jacob eventually fled from his father-in-law with his wives, children, livestock, and all their possessions. Laban tried to stop them in Genesis 30:27, "But Laban said to him, 'If I have found favor in your eyes, please stay. ... The Lord has blessed me because of you." Laban was looking after his own best interests!

20 years prior, Jacob had fled his birthplace with only his rod. Genesis 32 tells of him with his family on



the journey to his homeland. In Genesis 32:9-10, Jacob acknowledges the lovingkindness which God had shown him all his life, "I am unworthy of all the lovingkindness and of all the faithfulness which Thou has shown to Thy servant; for with my staff only I crossed this Jordan, and now I have become two companies." Genesis 32: 9-10.

Jacob is proof that God will forgive and bless us if we turn from our wrong decisions and follow His path. God truly wants to bless His children. We always have the opportunity to turn our face toward our Father and for his "lovingkindness."

God's lovingkindness can flow through us to others or from others to us. We are told to "love like Jesus" so others may see Him. We see this love on display in a teacher taking extra time with students in need, or a nurse giving an encouraging word to a patient who has not had visitors. The world seems to be in such chaos, and I believe displays of lovingkindness are more needed now than ever.

arriage is not for the faint of heart. Especially when you begin a relationship as a non-believer, then God radically transforms your life.

I became a believer first, then Marshall, my husband, followed a few years later. Unlike myself, who had been raised in a Christian home, Marshall had no reference for what a Christian or Christian marriage should look like.



As a result, our marriage began to unravel. We found ourselves in marriage counseling and felt like it was our only hope. We usually went to counseling together, but Marshall went alone on one rare occasion. I will never forget what happened. He

came home angry. He got inches from my face and loudly proclaimed, "We're going to be married forever, so we better get this right!"

The next several weeks were notably better until we had a major blowup. At the time, I was a financial advisor and had an evening appointment. When I got in the car, I was angry, crying, and furious. I had never contemplated divorce, but I wished Marshall would have said the word that day because I would have grabbed it and run as fast as possible.

As I pulled out of the driveway, I slipped a Twyla Paris cassette into the player (yes, this story is that old). As I heard the words of the song, God began to soften my heart. The words spoke of God not giving up on someone who kept making the same mistakes and closed with the statement, "neither will I". It was a clear message from the Lord; I was to fight for my marriage and our relationship.

Malachi 2:16 teaches, "God hates divorce." But sometimes, divorce is the only answer. God does, however, love both people involved in the conflict and wants the best for them separately and together. As believers, we must do everything we possibly can to not only reconcile but create a harmonious living environment. We must do everything we can to love and honor our commitment to one another and together.

It does not describe David as perfect or as one who never sinned. He did know God's laws and ways and did strive to follow what he knew to be right. David wrote about people who seemed to be focused only on themselves and "do not despise evil" Psalm 36:4.



David changed and began to praise God for being faithful in loving those who love Him and judging those who follow their own ways. Psalm 36:6-7 recounts, "Thy righteousness is like the mountains of God; Thy judgments are like a great deep. O Lord, Thou preservest man and beast. How precious is Thy lovingkindness, O God! And the children of men take refuge in the

shadow of Thy wings."



Can you imagine resting in the shadow of God's wings? I want that feeling. I want to feel the overwhelming peace and 100% protection of Our Father. I want to be so filled with the lovingkindness of God that



not one other thing enters my thoughts. I love the outdoors and feel the love of our Savior in a beautiful sunset or sunrise. the coldest winters
in Texas history,
and I believe it was a season
when we were to sit up and
take notice!

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Four million Texans lost electric power, water, and gas for days. There were no electronics. A glance outside showed a barren landscape, a frozen land. It would have been easy to feel despair, but I saw hope!

We are blessed to have many trees in our yard, some at least a hundred years old. One fascinates me. It is a large 60-year-old tree that grows crooked! It leans so far I think it may fall, but still, it stands. Surrounding trees grow straight and tall. During the cold winter, these trees had only a touch of snow on their branches and none on their trunks. The crooked tree, however, had a thick layer of snow on its branches, and even the trunk was covered.

This tree reminds me of King David. It is vital and will live many years, but it has become bent over time. Because of how this tree has grown, it carried an



enormous burden of snow, unlike the trees that have grown straight. Because of our life decisions, we become "crooked" and often carry heavy loads. We simply need to stand straight in the Father's



love. Psalm 59:16 praises, "But as for me, I shall sing of Thy strength; Yes, I shall joyfully sing of Thy lovingkindness in the morning, for thou hast been my stronghold and a refuge in the day of my distress."

The sun always comes out and melts the snow from the tree. It then springs back to life, grows green leaves, becomes a home for birds and squirrels, and provides shade for us. Because of the lovingkindness of our Father, who gave us His only Son, we are being released from the burdens of our hearts. Out of our winter is the spring of Jesus, bringing us new life and allowing us to flourish.

Don't stay in your winter covered with heavy burdens. Instead, come into your spring and walk in freedom with the One who loves you!

DAY 10 DESERT PRAISES

Psalm 63:3

cholars believe David was in the desert when he wrote this Psalm to the Lord.





They imagine David wrote this while living in the desert, being chased by Saul, or when he was in brief exile from the throne during the rebellion of his son, Absalom. Regardless, David was in a desert, both literally and figuratively.

In verses 1-2, David tells God his soul thirsts for Him, and his flesh longs for Him, "Even in a dry and thirsty land where there is no water." In verse 3, "Because Your lovingkindness is better than life, my lips will glorify you," David believed God's great love was a gift and that it was "better than life." David valued God's love and would sacrifice for it. People give love to one another. David wanted to express God's great love. No matter what occurred in David's life, he praised God with his lips.

What about you? Have you been in a dry, thirsty land in summer? I lived in Arizona six years. This California girl never expected to live in a desert,



but God had other plans. The first time I walked outside into 120 degrees, it felt like I had walked into an oven. Historical heat records were broken during my first summer in the desert.

God's great love took me to that "dry" period in my life and taught me to cling to Him. As David, I had to believe in my soul to see and feel God's lovingkindness. I was invited to join a weekly Bible study. My knowledge of the Word and my love of God grew exponentially. I learned to value this amazing love of God, though I had to sacrifice (in my case, time) to learn that love. I wanted everyone to feel this complete love. Listening exclusively to Christian music, I soon learned beautiful songs of praise.

David was in the desert, but he never hesitated to praise God. It is a lifelong goal to learn to proclaim that the love of God is greater than one's own life.

DAY 11

Some believe this was written at the time when the Jews returned from their captivity in Babylon. Verses 1-6 remind the Lord of the mercies He had shown his people: He restored the fortunes of Jacob (1), forgave everyone's sins (2), and turned away from His fierce anger (3). In verse 7, he asks God to "Show us Thy lovingkindness, O Lord, and grant us Thy Salvation." Verse 8 says, "I will hear what the Lord will say; For He will speak peace to His people, to His godly ones; But let them not turn back to folly."

The word "folly" is defined in the dictionary as a "lack of good sense" or "foolishness." It is an old-fashioned word that has significant meaning today as I reflect on what is happening worldwide. This Psalm is our warning. It



describes all the good that will come to the man who follows the ways of the Lord. The land will yield produce, and the Lord will give what is good.



However, what happens when we turn

to folly? Old Testament history warns how God often reacts to people who turn from Him. Sodom and Gomorrah were destroyed, the world flooded, the Jews were taken captive, etc. What will happen today to those living with foolishness or "folly"?

Is it folly to live each day trying to please others instead of pleasing God? Is it folly to follow the radical thinking of many of the accepted patterns of the world instead of those of The Lord?

Look at your life today. Search your heart. Are you making decisions that lack good sense? Turn your heart back to the One who loves you the most! Turn your heart back to Jesus.



UNLOVABLE MY STORY

s I prepared to write this story, I clearly understood God wanted me to write about loving people who are often difficult to love. You know who they are in your life, the ones who drive you crazy and wish would vanish.

I believe God put these people in our lives for our good. In Luke 6:27, we are told, "But I say to you who hear, love your enemies, do good to those who hate you." Verse 31 is very explicit, "And just as you want people



to treat you, treat them in the same way." The Bible is not telling us to treat well only those people we love, but everyone! That, my friends, is difficult.

I have been friends with the Smith family for thirty years. They have lost a son to alcoholism and have accepted and continued to love a son who has professed homosexuality. The mother has had a severe injury



and consequent knee surgery and rehabilitation. It has now become time to make decisions about long-term care for the patriarch of the family, whose health is physically and mentally declining.

The burden of this decision lies on the eldest daughter, Veronica. Here's the clincher.... the aging father has never been very nice to his daughter. He has blamed her for the bad choices her siblings have made and never respected that she has taken good care of the family finances and kept a roof over their heads. He has become a very insensitive person. He berates her and anyone trying to help him. He argues with the caregivers. He fights kindness and love every step of the way.


Many people face this dilemma, and many walk away from the complex parts of life. However, Veronica works daily with caregivers and therapists to help her



father regain strength and continue to live independently. She checks on him several times daily and ensures he is clean and eats healthy food. She tells him she loves him and only wants the best for him. I highly respect this friend and believe she is representing the love of Jesus to her father. John 13:35 "By this all men will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another."

Matthew 5:43-45 teaches, "You have heard that it was said, 'You shall love your neighbor[, and hate your enemy.' 'But I say to you, love your enemies, and pray for those who persecute you, in order that you may be sons of your Father who is in heaven." As believers of Jesus Christ, we are called to love the unlovable. This is not a suggestion but an attribute that identifies us as believers.

To pasture

"From very ancient antiquity, rulers were described as demonstrating their legitimacy to rule by their ability to "pasture" their people. Hammurabi and many other rulers of ancient western Asia are called "shepherd" or described as "pasturing" their subjects. In the OT, however, it is the Lord who feeds his people and is praised for his mercy in providing for them (Gen 48:15; Ps 23:1; 28:9; Isa 40:11; Hos 4:16 et al). This attribute of God is one of the marks of the offices of prophets, priest, and king. David's claim to the throne is based upon God's command that he feed the people (II Sam 5:2). Failure of the officers of Israel to feed the people either physical or spiritual nourishment was deemed a severe transgression (Ezk 34:2ff.) In this chapter the prophet plays repeatedly on the two forms of the root, rā'â, the verb meaning "to pasture" and the noun meaning the "pastor" or shepherd. The true repetition of the ideas is lost in all the versions by supplying synonyms where the Hebrew uses the same term throughout. The OT theological vision of the good shepherd who feeds his flock with God's truth (Jer 3:15 etc.) becomes prominent in the NT (Jn 10:11)."1

"And Samuel said to Jesse, "Are these all the children?" And he said, "There remains yet the youngest, and behold, he is tending the sheep." Then Samuel said to Jesse, "Send and bring him; for we will not sit down until he comes here."

1 Samuel 16:11

God connects love with being a shepherd.





God tells Samuel, 1 Samuel 16, He will reveal the future King of Israel. The Lord leads Samuel to Jesse's home in Bethlehem. Of Jessie's oldest, he thinks, "Surely the Lord's anointed is before Him" (Verse 6). God exclaims, "But the Lord said to Samuel, "Do not look at his appearance or at the height of his stature, because I have rejected him; for God sees not as man sees, for man looks at the outward appearance, but the Lord looks at the heart." (1 Samuel 16:7). Samuel learned how God considers people for leadership, not how man chooses leaders.

Jesse's sons passed before Samuel one by one, and the Lord rejected each one. Finally, Samuel asked, "Are these all the children?" (Verse 11). Even David's father, Jessie, never conceived his youngest son could be the future king; after all, David was merely a shepherd boy.

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Yet, God had been training David from a young age. What did he learn? He learned how to care for the weak and helpless, those who couldn't take care of themselves. He realized he had to lay down his life for his sheep, sometimes fighting bears. His job was to protect the sheep at all costs, and the sheep would trust and rely on their shepherd.

God's training ground for leadership usually looks different from the world's training. David's started with him learning to love and care for the weakest and defenseless. God wants to raise an army of leaders for a lost and helpless generation that needs to know Him. We must learn to love like a shepherd, THE shepherd, to impact the next generation.

Yādîd One greatly loved

"The basic meaning of the noun is "one greatly loved" by God or by man. The noun is derived from the verb "love" (ydd) (BDB; KB).

This noun is primarily employed to describe the nation of Israel (or Judah) and individuals as those who are greatly loved by the Lord. Such love by God brings protection (cf. Benjamin; Deut 33:12) and prosperity (Ps 127:2) upon the beloved people. This love demonstrates the reason for God's continual faithfulness to his people Israel, even when they were disobedient and unfaithful (Jer 11:15). It is upon the basis of this love of God for Israel that she petitions for the Lord to hear and deliver her from judgment (Ps 60:5 [H 7]; 108:6 [H 7]). Isaiah describes the Lord, the vinedresser of unfaithful Israel, as his beloved (Isa 5:1), showing his great love for the Lord. The psalmist rejoices in the temple dwellings as "lovely" (or "beloved"), i.e. the place where he delights to worship the Lord."

ave you ever felt as if you didn't belong?


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For a follower of Jesus, this is not an absurd question. Everyone has a sense of needing to belong and feel at home. Home is safe. Home is comfort. It's a natural instinct to go to great lengths to make our family and friends feel comfortable in our home.

Psalm 84 echoes this sentiment, "How lovely are Thy dwelling places, O Lord of hosts! My soul longed and even yearned for the courts of the Lord; My heart and my flesh sing for joy to the living God" (Psalm 84:1-2). God goes to great lengths for us to feel at home. For a child of the living God, His courts are part of our home, this is where we should feel safe and comfortable. This is where we should long to be. His courts are part of our eternal reward where we will spend eternity with Him.



When we feel as if we don't belong, it's because we're not home yet! God creates a home in our hearts. God's heart is relationship. He wants intimacy with His people.

Remember when you dated someone you loved? You longed to talk with them and listened intently to their every word. This is who God should be to us. He is the one we can run to when we are lonely, insecure, or feeling out of place. He will lovingly listen and take us into His courts to comfort and console us. "For a day in Thy courts is better than a thousand outside. I would rather stand at the threshold of the house of my God, than dwell in the tents of wickedness" (Psalm 84:10).

There are several ideas attached to God's deep, tender love: first, the unconditional election of God (Ex 33:19); next, his mercy and forgiveness toward his people in the face of deserved judgment and upon the condition of their repentance (Deut 13:17); also, God's continuing mercy and grace in preserving his unrepentant people from judgment (II Kgs 13:23). Thus this attribute becomes the basis in part of an eschatological hope (cf. Isa 14:1; 49:13; 54:7; Jer 12:15; 33:26; Ezk 34:25; Mic 7:19; Zech 1:16). It is noteworthy that Deuteronomy (30:3) prophesies the exile because of Israel's sin, stipulating that repentance will meet with God's tender compassion. So we read of the withdrawal of God's mercy resulting in harsh judgment at the hands of Babylon (Isa 9:17 [H 16]; 27:11; Hos 2:4). During the exile Israel's leaders encouraged the people with God's electing love and tender-mercy (Lam 3:32), and led them in humbling themselves in repentance, calling upon God to reinstate his fatherlike compassion (Zech 1:12). The restitution of the fatherson relationship and the return from the exile witnesses this accompanying loving care (Hos 2:23). Scripture makes it certain that the exile was brought by God and terminated by God (Ezk 39:25) according to his sovereign providence (Isa 30:18; cf. E. J. Young, The Book of Isaiah, II, p. 353f.). Finally, the prophets' message regarding the return from the exile opens onto a permanent state where the father-son relationship will never be broken (Hos 2:23; Isa 54:8, 10)."1

DAY 14 GRACIOUS COMPASSIONATE LOVE

"The Lord longs to be gracious to you, and therefore He waits on high to have compassion on you. For the Lord is a God of justice; How blessed are all those who long for Him."

Isaiah 30:18



saiah 30:1 declares, "Woe to the rebellious children," declares the Lord, "Who execute a plan, but not Mine, and make an alliance, but not of My Spirit, in order to add sin to sin."



Isaiah was a prophet with a challenging message. He was to tell the Southern Kingdom, Judah, to return to the Lord or He would send them into the hands of their enemies.

300 years earlier, Israel had chosen an earthly king, "that we also may be like all the nations" (1 Samuel 8:20). Instead of trusting and serving the King of kings, the children of Israel were far from the Lord and His commandments. Isaiah was told by the Lord, "do not omit a word" (Jeremiah 26:2) of the Lord's message for Judah. Today, we know Israel, the Northern Kingdom, had been taken captive by Assyria; and Judah, the Southern Kingdom, was one hundred years from being captured by King Nebuchadnezzar of Babylon.

Was there something Judah could have done to prevent capture and slavery to a pagan king? Isaiah 30:15 reveals, "'In repentance and rest you shall



be saved, in quietness and trust is your strength.' But you were not willing." This passage clearly warned of the key to Judah's salvation, repentance. But regrettably, it also tells us they were not willing. This principle is as true today as it was for Judah, regardless of whether we are talking about an individual relationship with the Lord, or a nation or people group. Salvation lies in repentance. Freedom lies in repentance.

Mercifully we have a God who is always available. He is a God who will show up when we stop being stiff-necked and rebellious. Isaiah 30:18 reassures us, "Therefore the Lord longs to be gracious to you, and therefore He waits on high to have compassion on you. For the Lord is a God of justice; How blessed are all those who long for Him." God loves us, so He heaps compassion and mercy on we who repent and turn to Him. He is a God who will never forsake those who trust in Him.

example, the usage in Jn 21:15–17 seems to reflect simply a rhetorical alternation designed to avoid undue repetition. There is, however, one significant clue to possible meaningful differences in at least some contexts, namely, the fact that people are never commanded to love one another with $\phi\iota\lambda\dot{\epsilon}\omega$ or $\phi\iota\lambda\dot{\epsilon}\alpha$, but only with $\dot{\alpha}\gamma\alpha\pi\dot{\alpha}\omega$ and $\dot{\alpha}\gamma\dot{\alpha}\pi\eta$. Though the meanings of these terms overlap considerably in many contexts, there are probably some significant differences in certain contexts; that is to say, $\phi\iota\lambda\dot{\epsilon}\omega$ and $\phi\iota\lambda\dot{\epsilon}\alpha$ are likely to focus upon love or affection based upon interpersonal association, while $\dot{\alpha}\gamma\alpha\pi\dot{\alpha}\omega$ and $\dot{\alpha}\gamma\dot{\alpha}\pi\eta$ focus upon love and affection based on deep appreciation and

high regard. On the basis of this type of distinction, one can understand some of the reasons for the use of $d\gamma a\pi d\omega$ and $d\gamma d\pi \eta$ in commands to Christians to love one another. It would,



however, be quite wrong to assume that $\phi\iota\lambda\dot{\epsilon}\omega$ and $\phi\iota\lambda\dot{\epsilon}\alpha$ refer only to human love, while $\dot{\alpha}\gamma\alpha\pi\dot{\alpha}\omega$ and $\dot{\alpha}\gamma\dot{\alpha}\pi\eta$ refer to divine love. Both sets of terms are used for the total range of loving relations between people, between people and God, and between God and Jesus Christ.¹

DAY 15 JESUS' LOVE

"I say to you, love your enemies, and pray for those who persecute you."

Matthew 5:44

esus' first recorded teaching is the Sermon on the Mount.



By then, He had quite a following. Large crowds followed because of the healings He performed (Matthew 4:23-24). His instructions were controversial, such as,



"Blessed are you when men cast insults at you, and persecute you (Matthew 5:11)." He also upset the religious leaders by preaching reconciliation with one's brother (vs. 24) and making friends with opponents (vs.25).

I can imagine people in the crowds looking at one another, even whispering. Jesus' teaching was so radical and contentious that eventually, John 6:66 tells us, "As a result of this many of His disciples withdrew, and were not walking with Him anymore." Then as now, disciples make choices as to whom to serve and follow.

Today, the world chooses tolerance over repentance. A biblical worldview calls a believer to live a righteous and holy life; a life set apart or sanctified. We find ourselves in conflict with the world when we choose God. The Bible states clearly, the more we become like Jesus, the more the world struggles with our

Then it comes to God's love, ágape love, we humans think it's complicated.





Why? Because our feelings get in the way. What do I mean? God's ágape love is desiring God's best for someone, not what we, as humans, think is best.

Judging by emotions can cause confusion, particularly using a modern-day standard of love and tolerance as a plumbline. The alcoholic could respond, "You don't love me!" yet you are expressing the purest form of love. You are doing what is best for the person instead of doing what he wants.

God's love focuses on the end result, which is, first and foremost, eternity. God loves us enough to make provision for our eternity. God knew many would reject His Son as deliverance from their sins. Yet God still sent His Son, His only Son, to die for the sins of the world, especially for those who reject God's precious gift of salvation.

In Luke 19, when Jesus rode into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday 2,000 years ago, the people wanted a king to save them from their tyrannical king. They wanted an earthly king to protect them. But



God didn't give them what they wanted; He gave them what they needed. They didn't need a king; they needed a Savior, someone who sacrificed for their sins to provide them eternal life. 



Jesus addressed everyone when He


DAY 18 GREATER LOVE

he account of Jesus' last Passover with His disciples, just before the crucifixion, begins in John 13.





be a disciple of Jesus, we love as He loved.







In the mid-nineteen-nineties, I wasn't a seasoned traveler. I was headed to Chicago's Cook County Jail with hundreds of other ministers to share the good news of Jesus Christ with those held captive. But I had a plan, or so I thought. Upon



arrival, the ministry I was serving with had transportation waiting to take me to the hotel.

The plane was four hours late, and no one was there to meet me. When I phoned the ministry, everyone was already gone for the day. I didn't know the name or location of the hotel; as I said, I wasn't a seasoned traveler. And to make matters worse, I had very little cash with me. I was in a world of hurt. So, what was I going to do?



I said a frantic 911 prayer, the one where

you cry out to the Lord in desperation. At that moment, I saw a very tall elderly woman in tattered clothes, looking quite lost. I thought to help her, what else did I have to do? I quickly realized she didn't speak English. I looked at her ticket and led her to her gate.

After fifteen minutes, we arrived at her gate, there I saw a man wearing a hat with the ministry name of the organization I was serving with for the weekend. I turned to the man, asked him to hold up for a moment, and then turned around to say my goodbyes to the woman. She had vanished! It had only been a few seconds.

Hebrews 1:14 teaches, "Are they (angels), not all ministering spirits, sent out to render service for the sake of those who will inherit salvation?" 

DAY 20 SUFFERING LOVE

"We know that God causes all things to work together for good to those who love God, to those who are called according to His purpose."

Romans 8:28

But studying this passage in the context of Romans, many do not have a proper understanding of Paul's teaching.

Chapter eight of Romans addresses not walking according to the flesh, being dead to sin, and walking alive by the Spirit. Paul exhorts that we are heirs with Christ if we suffer with Him to glorify us (Romans 8:17) and, Romans 8:18, "For I consider that the sufferings of this present time are not worthy to be compared with the glory that is to be revealed to us."

This context unmistakably explains suffering as part of the Christian life. Paul boldly states in verse 35, "Who shall separate us from the love of Christ?" He then lists possible scenarios in which we may be found tribulation, distress, persecution, famine, nakedness, peril or sword. These situations are not what the American church imagines when we speak of living for Christ. We believe

this happens in other countries or possibly at another time. Paul wants to make it clear to us that despite our circumstances, God loves us!



Paul further emphasizes his

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stand on suffering as he quotes Psalm 44:22, "For thy sake we are killed all day long; we are considered as sheep to be slaughtered." Are we willing to lay down our lives just as Christ did for us?

His final thought begins, "In all things we overwhelmingly conquer through Him who loved us" (Romans 8:37). In studying Romans, the context suggests Romans 8:28 is teaching us that God will work His purpose in and through our suffering for the benefit of the kingdom of God. Why? Because we love Him. But how can that be? Because He first loved us (1 John 4:19).



aul addressed the Corinthian church to explain the never-ending love of God.








Paul was very attached to the people in this town, which is modern-day Turkey. He was shocked they were not following the actual teachings of Jesus.

This book covers six chapters with three main themes: protecting the gospel, clarifying the gospel, and walking out the gospel.

Paul asked in Galatians 1:10, "For am I now seeking the favor of men, or of God? Or am I striving to please men?" Then as now, this cautions that we are to please only God. These words jump off the page at me, screaming this is precisely what is happening today. How many of us are striving to please man instead of God?



Chapters 3 and 4 found Paul reminding the church that they would be saved by faith alone in Jesus Christ, not by works. This was a challenge to the Jewish people who had lived under the law for generations. Galatians 3:13 declares, "Christ redeemed us from the curse of the Law, having become a curse for us." Jesus Christ became the new covenant for all humanity.

In Galatians 5:6 Paul explained the old rituals and practices no longer mattered, "For in Christ Jesus neither circumcision nor uncircumcision means anything, but faith working through love." People who believe God loves them, in and through Jesus, will respond by loving God and then loving others.



people would be discouraged. The three disciples visited other cities as well to spread the Word and escape persecution.

Paul wrote his first letter to the church of Thessalonica in 51 A.D. I sincerely enjoy how Paul began his letters, sending well wishes to his fellow believers and thanking God for them. Paul demonstrated his love and care toward those who would hear his words. He reminded them in chapter 1 he knew they had been filled with the Holy Spirit, and they were "examples to all the believers in Macedonia and Achaia," 1 Thessalonians 1:7.

Paul reminded the Thessalonians in chapter 3 he was no longer with them because he could not endure the suffering. He wrote, "the tempter might have tempted you, and our labor should be in vain," 1 Thessalonians 3:5. Paul's



prayer for them, "And may the Lord cause you to increase and abound in love for one another, and for all men, just as we do for you," 1 Thessalonians 3:12. This was followed by the assurance that The Lord would find their hearts "unblameable in holiness before our God and Father," 1 Thessalonians 3:13.

John is the middle child of this large family. John enlisted in the U. S. Navy at 18 and loyally served our country. Shortly after discharge, he joined a group of friends on an adventure looking for gold in the mountains of Idaho. During





a trip returning from town for supplies, he was a passenger in a truck that took a nasty curve, fell off the side of the road, and ignited into flames. The truck rolled several times down a steep embankment and came to rest among large trees in a desolate area. There was no civilization for miles.

The next part of this story is an example of a true miracle. The truck was in flames,

and John could not get out because the door was welded shut (it was an old truck). However, some backpackers just happened to be right there and saw the entire accident. They pulled John out through the window and called for help. He was airlifted to Salt Lake City, Utah, to the burn center at the University hospital.



John had 3rd-degree burns over 30%

of his body, but with good care and much work, he is alive and thriving. He has a son and daughter, and three beautiful grandchildren.

I believe God sent those hikers to the right place at the right time to save John's life.

John is the guy who brings gift cards to give to a flight attendant who is kind to others. He is the guy who opens the door for people and has a kind word for everyone. John is a walking miracle, and he tries to share that with the world.

We are told in Jeremiah 29:11, "For I know the plans that I have for you, declares the Lord, plans for welfare and not for calamity to give you a future and a hope." I am thankful God showed my family His love for John, and us, by sending his "angels" to rescue my brother. This is a pure example of God-loving. He has plans for John's life. He has plans for John's children, and grandchildren, and their heirs.

DAY 25 SPIRIT WITHIN

postle Paul, nearing
the end of his
earthly ministry,
felt compelled to write Timothy
to remind him of critical
information.





First, he reminded Timothy, he had received "the gift of God which is in you" 2 Timothy 1:6. It was this gift Timothy was destined to share the Good News with everyone. 2 Timothy 1:7 describes our gifts, "For God has not given us a spirit of timidity, but of power and love and discipline." These, my friend, are true gifts! Not only were these given to Timothy, but to every true disciple of the Lord Jesus Christ!

The opposite of "timidity" is "boldness." We are to be bold when sharing about Jesus. We are not to fear the trials of this world because we have been given a spirit of power—the power to overcome.




This verse, 1 John 3:16, "We know love by this, that He laid down His life for us; and we ought to lay down our lives for the brethren," cites God's agápé love for us, but also expresses the type of love for one human to another in an empathy bond. Greeks call this storge love.

A similar verse is Romans 12:10, "Be devoted to one another in brotherly love; give preference to one another in honor." I recently spoke with a Marine veteran who had served in the Viet Nam war. He told me of the horrors of war not usually openly admitted and of coming home from war to be shunned in dishonor by opponents of the war. I recently heard a podcast featuring a former Navy Seal. He spoke of, "just doing his job" of putting

his country and comrades before himself.

He told of losing fellow Seals in battle
and the sacrifices they make to uphold
the Constitution of The United States
and to keep us safe.





being deployed to unknown and desolate places. Following orders to fulfill missions, he is a perfect example of these verses.

Friend, God did not give these Bible verses merely for the military or those in law enforcement. They are for every single one of us to believe, embrace and follow. MY STORY

It's been said there is no more incredible pain than the loss of a child. While I can agree with the statement, there is no way I can comprehend or understand it. Recently, a high school classmate of mine, April, tragically lost her son. My heart broke for her and her family. Yet even in



her grief and pain, her love and concern for others were displayed to the world.

We are taught, "We know love by this, that He (Jesus) laid down His life for us; and we ought to lay down our lives for the brethren" (1 John 3:16). Out of this heartbreak, one of a Christian's most difficult principles was witnessed by everyone watching. April's son was on life support for many days, and when



there was no hope of sustaining his life, the decision was made to donate his organs.

April turned her sorrow into someone else's joy. Despite her grief, she understood the value of life and giving life to those in need. I could never write as eloquently as she did about the event. She posted on social media the following "Somewhere tonight, a parent is praying for their child to be given an organ so they might live another day. In the next few hours, phones will begin to ring to notify people that today is the day. The day they've been hoping and praying for. The day they get another chance at life as these people make their way to the hospitals where the transplants will take place. Be in prayer. Pray

for good weather, skilled pilots, a rested transplant team, and skilled surgeons.


And please pray for me. Tonight, I'm a mother who needs strength and peace as I say goodbye to my son. May his death provide many others with life."

In today's world, we want to believe loving someone should be easy, but Christ's life example and death prove otherwise. 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DAY 27 THE LOVE OF JESUS

"Those whom I love, I reprove and discipline;
be zealous therefore, and repent."

Revelation 3:19

evelation 3:19 teaches, "Those whom I love, I reprove and discipline; therefore, be zealous and repent."



John's message to the church in Laodicea is one of seven churches to which Jesus instructed him to send the book of Revelation.

Why did the Laodicean church need discipline and repentance? First, their faith was lukewarm, they were neither hot nor cold. The city received its water from two other cities. One provided water from hot springs, the other pure cold water. But, when the waters reached Laodicea, they were



no longer hot or cold, but lukewarm. Jesus said He would rather the church be hot or cold.

The second problem was their perception as opposed to reality. Laodicea was important for two reasons. It was a leading metropolis since it was on a major trade route. And it had become well-known for a salve that cured eye diseases developed by a local doctor. Both factors made the Laodiceans prosperous. So, they believed they were wealthy, but Jesus warned they were poor, blind, and naked. They confused their human condition with their spiritual condition.

These were Jesus' instructions to the church for healing:

- 1. Buy refined gold from Him to make them rich.
- 2. Clothe themselves with white garments to cover their nakedness.
- 3. Buy eye salve from Him to cure their blindness.

What did He mean? Pure gold endures almost 2,000-degree temperatures to remove impurities, making it fit for use. We, too, must have the impurities of our lives removed. White garments are an indication of a pure heart and a

pure life. Finally, we are blind in many ways. We need to allow God to apply His eye salve, then we see our imperfections and sin as He does and can allow Him to work in our lives to heal us.



What was Jesus' motivation for admonishing the church? Revelation 3:19 reveals that He loves us. He loves us with agápé love, which gives us what we need, not what we want. Are you lukewarm? Do you have a perception problem? The Lord loves you enough to want you to repent.

LOVE AS THE FATHER LOVES

"Do not love (ágapó) the world nor the things in the world. If anyone loves (agápé) the world, the love (agápé) of the Father is not in him. For all that is in the world, the lust of the flesh and the lust of the eyes and the boastful pride of life, is not from the Father, but is from the world."

1 John 2:15-16

od's Word teaches, "The god of this world [Satan] has blinded the minds of the unbelieving so that they might not see the light of the gospel of the glory of Christ, who is the image of God" (2 Corinthians 4:4).



Because of Satan's schemes, the unbeliever cannot understand the light of the gospel without our Lord's intervention. Therefore, the natural state of a believer—those



who love God—will conflict with the ways of the world and the "god of this world."

As believers, we walk a fine line, loving the ungodly but knowing their behavior is in direct opposition to God and His Kingdom. Each day, the Lord's return draws closer, and the more the world becomes infected with a reprobate mind and behavior.

The dilemma collides when you come face to face with the question, "How do I love the people of the world as God commands us?" "How do we become the hands and feet of Jesus to lead them to His saving grace?"

Our first weapon of love is prayer. Never underestimate the power of prayer. We must pray the Lord remove the clay from their blinded eyes, so they are capable of seeing truth. Only then will they have the opportunity to repent and turn to the only One who can save them from evil. We must also pray God




to open doors of opportunity for us to have frank godly conversations about God's saving grace. Finally, we must be bold. We must stand and shout the goodness of God to the nations. Not only must we be the hands and feet of Jesus, but we must be His mouthpiece.*




Though this event is yet to come, the Bible gives us abundant information to appreciate their trials and tribulations. We learn Satan and his angels will be thrown out of heaven. At that time, a voice from heaven will announce, "The accuser [Satan] of our brethren has been thrown down, who accuses them [the brethren or believers] before our God day and night" (Revelation 12:10b).

Did you notice Satan is before God, day and night, making accusations against God's own? My friend, if you believe in Jesus Christ and have made Him the Lord of your life, this is about you! Let's think about this. The accuser of the breather spends his time in the presence of God attempting to kill, steal and destroy us. We are in warfare. Life is not passive for a believer. We are

warriors in an invisible spiritual realm.

A warrior's life IS a walk of faith to which we have been called.



By what means does this verse say we

will overcome? First, we prevail because of the blood of the Lamb. We know we are on the winning team with Jesus because His sacrificial death secured our victory. The next way we overcome is by the word of our testimony. We all have one. Some are dramatic or exciting; some are sweet, tender, and endearing. Each of us has a life that testifies to God's faithfulness. Our witness says who He is and what He has done in our lives. Lastly, disciples of Jesus Christ live boldly, without fear, since our immortal life is not here on earth but in heaven, with our Savior. We do not love (ἀγαπάω - Agapaó) our earthly life since we don't hold it in high regard. Instead, we value our promised eternity with the One who created us.

To have love or affection for someone or something based on association.



φιλέωα: ὁ φιλῶν πατέρα ἢ μητέρα ὑπὲρ ἐμὲ οὐκ ἔστιν μου ἄζιος 'the person who loves his father or mother more than me is not worthy of me' Mt 10:37.

φιλία: ἡ φιλία τοῦ κόσμου ἔχθρα τοῦ θεοῦ ἐστιν 'affection for the world is hostility toward God' Jas 4:4. In a number of languages, it may be difficult if not impossible to speak of 'affection ... is hostility.' Frequently it is necessary to relate such emotional attitudes to individuals so that this expression in Jas 4:4 may be rendered in some languages as 'people who love the things in the world are against God.'

DAY 30 AGÁPÉ VS. PHILIA

"He said to him the third time, "Simon, son of John, do you love Me?" Peter was grieved because He said to him the third time, "Do you love Me?" And he said to Him, "Lord, You know all things; You know that I love You." Jesus said to him, "Tend My sheep."

John 21:17

o truly understand this conversation between Jesus and Peter, we must travel back to the original language.



Love has several meanings in the Greek language. Two of these meanings are used in this verse. Agápé is unconditional, sacrificial love; the other, philia, is affection for a close friend.



Let's put the conversation in context. "When they had finished breakfast, Jesus said to Simon Peter, 'Simon, son of John, do you love (agápé) Me more than these?' He (Peter) said to Him (Jesus), 'Yes, Lord; You know that I love (philia) You.' He said to him, 'Tend My lambs.' He said to him again a second time, 'Simon, son of John, do you love (agápé) Me?' He said to Him, 'Yes, Lord; You know that I love (philia) You.' He said to him, 'Shepherd My sheep.' He said to him the third time, 'Simon, son of John, do you love (agápé) Me?' Peter was grieved because He said to him the third time, 'Do you love (agápé) Me?' And he said to Him, 'Lord, You know all things; You know that I love (philia) You.' Jesus said to him, 'Tend My sheep'" (John 21:15-17). Every time Jesus used the word agápé, Peter used the word philia.

Earlier, Peter had egregiously denied Jesus three times. Peter had already denied Jesus three times. If I were Peter, I would have gone from a confidant

disciple who boldly claimed, "Even though all may fall away because of You, I will never fall away" (Matthew 26:33) to a meek and remorseful disciple. Feelings of guilt and failure would creep into my mind. We can't know Peter's thoughts, but it's reasonable to conclude that since that failure, Peter didn't trust himself



capable of unconditionally loving Jesus or His people.

Jesus knew Peter would one day revert to being the bold, outspoken leader and become a wise and vigilant servant of the Lord. One day Peter would be martyred on a cross just like his Savior. You may be a meek, remorseful disciple, but Jesus is calling you to be the wise, outspoken leader. "Trust in the Lord with all your heart, and do not lean on your own understanding. In all your ways acknowledge Him, and He will make your paths straight" (Proverbs 3:5-6).
